# Mayhem Regatta 2024

Day one of the Mayhem regatta started with the inaugural (but not the first) edition of the 'SB20's fattest man contest'. When it comes to expat men on scales, it is one of the items on the schedule that draws the biggest crowd. Sidewalk Cafe having a good start off the line at the favoured boat end and with the plan to go right allowed the fleet to cross to the favoured right hand side and settled into 3rd place with the returning teams of Tara and Fugazi showing that their World Championship experience had given them an edge pulling away comfortably. Sitting in 3rd place, SWC dropped their spinnaker as they crossed the finish line only to realise that they should have attended the skippers briefing or at least read the sailing instructions. Thanks to the sportsmanship and amusement of the finished teams, they were able to get around the last gate and finish upwind learning a valuable lesson - not to leave their radio on the dock.

The following races were much the same with Tara and Fugazi having some battles at the front and the occasional cameo from Sidewalk Cafe who were only really allowed a sniff when Tara briefly tried to catch ikanbillis with their spinnaker.

The starts were tight and tide helping boats over the line, the top boats in Fugazi and Tara scored OCS's on day 1 to keep the results tight. **Dean Othman** and team of **Haireel** and **Joelle** were consistent over both days and set up another first in their first ever podium regatta finish with super consistent sailing. **Chloe Seah's** NUS team sailed well and were in the mix all regatta.

Day 2 saw the Incident free of incidents and showing the form we are more accustomed to with a bullet in the first race putting the fleet on notice. They went on to finish 2nd on the day to eventual and habitual regatta winners Tara sailed by the big name, finely tuned crew of **Agoston Sipos**, **Freddie Hall** and **Magnus Ekbom**.

Fugazi sailed by **Ewan McEwan** with his crew of **Darrel Lim** and **Keegan Tan** put in one of their best local performances to finish second overall and really hit some form heading into our locally hosted worlds in January 2025.

# 'Rules Reality' with Ewan Mc Ewan

### **SB20 Rules Reality**

What is Keeping Clear?

This question might seem to have an obvious answer, though you might want to think again as it's one of the toughest rules in the book - let me explain:

Imagine a typical situation going upwind, two boats one on port tack and one on starboard tack. They are on a collision course.

The port tack boat bears away and passes the starboard tack boat's stern missing by a couple of centimetres. Was the port tack boat keeping clear?

Nobody would penalise the port tack boat. There was no contact, right!

What about if the situation is the same though this time the port tack boat passes a couple of centimetres across the bow of the starboard tack boat, was the port tack boat keeping clear? Probably not.

So, as you can see keeping clear means different things in different situations and it means more than just avoiding contact.

What if the port tack boat feels that they were keeping clear and starboard tack boat felt that they weren't keeping clear, what happens in that situation? Well, here we can refer to case law as Case 50 tells us that if the starboard tack boat has 'a reasonable apprehension' that there will be a collision and they alter course to avoid a collision, even if it wasn't actually required to avoid a collision, then the port tack boat gets penalised.

Further, when boats are on the same tack how do we judge if the windward boat is keeping clear? This is quite tricky because often, though not always, the boats will be flying gennakers.

Let's go to the rule book and see what it says, here is a link to World Sailing where the rule books and associated documentation are free to download:

On page 7 you'll find the Definitions. These are rules and Keep Clear appears at the bottom of the page. Here it is reproduced in quotation marks:

"Keep Clear A boat keeps clear of a right-of-way boat

- (a) if the right-of-way boat can sail her course with no need to take avoiding action and,
- (b) when the boats are overlapped, if the right-of-way boat can also change course in both directions without immediately making contact."

So, as you can see when we have two boats overlapped on the same tack the second part of the definition applies. We have a nick name for this; 'wiggle room'.

If the leeward right of way boat can't change course in either direction without making immediate contact then the keep clear boat hasn't kept clear!

Now conditions make a huge difference. Add waves, gusts and strong winds and what would be considered keeping clear in flat water with a modest breeze would certainly not be keeping clear in

meter high waves and gusts of a strong breeze.

The more difficult the conditions the more room you need to give to keep clear. The term 'room' in this context is time, space and opportunity.

Additionally, if you look through the Case Book, you'll find numerous mentions of the term 'seamanlike', though how do you judge this? Have a look at Case 103 which helps:

**CASE 103** 

The phrase 'seamanlike way' in the definition Room refers to boat-handling that can reasonably be expected from a competent, but not expert, crew of the appropriate number for the boat.

At a Grade 1 Match Race event with the top teams in the world pretty much anything goes until it starts getting dangerous. In club racing we need to give much more room to allow people to respond to an opportunity to keep clear.

Increasingly as you move up the peaking order of any fleet the rules are used in a more combative mode. One of the joys of sailboat racing is the interaction between rules, tactics and boat handling – if you ever get the chance to watch a top team race, you'll be amazed at what the competitors can do with the boat to work with their team mates to hinder their opponents and win!
